

Pre-Columbian Supply List

Check to see if you already have some of these supplies before purchasing. For specific examples for those things listed with an asterisk, you can find them on an Amazon List at <https://a.co/fWaT7yf>. It is highly recommended that you purchase each item (or the equivalent) before the start of class if you do not already have access to them. You only need one of each unless otherwise stated. In some cases, we found that some of the items come in multiple packs on Amazon at a lower price than buying individually. Some things you can find at Dollar Tree, Allard's Art, GSW School Supply, Michael's, Office Depot or other stores at a lower price than on Amazon.

- Glue stick (Dollar Tree best price)
- Multi-color markers, broad line *
- Color pencils *
- Acrylic paints, multi-color * (Please note if you are taking other workshops that require acrylic paints, you might want to buy larger tubes.)
- White acrylic paint (8 oz) *
- Black acrylic paint (8 oz) *
- Antique gold acrylic paint (2 oz)
- White glue *
- Assorted paint brushes *
- Foam brushes *
- Palette knife *
- Crayola Model Magic *
- Clay tools *
- Masking tape (Dollar Tree)
- Multi-color cardstock * (as an alternative to buying a whole multi-color pack, you can get turquoise and jade green single sheets of paper where they sell scrapbooking supplies for under \$1 at Michael's—those are the colors you will need)
- White cotton bandana *
- Twin tip sharpie *
- Mod Podge *
- White cotton twine *
- Small colorful stones (just a few – Dollar Tree good source)
- Pencil/eraser (standard, 2B) and sharpener *

Household items you may already have:

- Scissors
- 12" Ruler

- Corrugated cardboard (about 24" x 24")
- Newspaper to protect surfaces from paint, etc.
- Paper plate or vegetable or meat trays (for paint palette)
- Small water spritzer bottle (to keep acrylics from drying out when on your palette) – you can find them in travel section of most drug stores or at Dollar Tree
- Paper towels
- Apron or old t-shirt to protect clothes
- Water jar (any wide-mouth, empty 5" or 6" high container will work) • Water access to clean brushes
